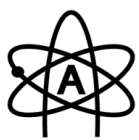

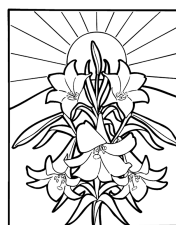

President's Thoughts



Don Heights at the Milne Hollow Gem?

As I write this we are just reaching the end of March Break. It's been a great week. On Monday, I did laundry and worked on the selection process for a paid co-ordinator for Middle Childhood Matters. Yeah, we've hired a great young woman!! On Tuesday I drove up to the Kortright Centre with Nicholas and family to explore the wonders of the woods and compare the taste of maple sap and maple syrup. We had the unexpected pleasure of discovering a small snake amongst the leaves along the path.

On Wednesday it was back to Middle Childhood and the Don Heights Fellowship meeting in the evening. Thursday brought a trip to High Park and the exploration of a castle-like playground designed by children for children. Friday will be Science Centre day for Nicholas and his entourage of aunts and grandparents.

On my regular drives over to Don Heights, since the snow has melted, I have been taking the Lawrence Avenue route so that I can see if the gates have been opened to **Milne Hollow** in the Charles Sauriol Conservation Area just east of the Don Valley Parkway. I do this because I'm dying to see what progress has been made on the walkway along the river. I want to take Nicholas for a walk along this path and explain the Bird Flyways. I hope lots of local parents and grandparents from the many cultures that live near Milne Hollow will find this wonderful woodland and the time to enjoy this little gem of nature with the children in their lives.

Milne Hollow is becoming a "**Sacred Space**" for me. Isn't a space sacred when people are preserving and designing the space to provide

sustenance and rest for birds as they make their migratory flights? It's a quiet, peaceful place beside the Don Valley Parkway, a place to contemplate the web of life of which we are a part. What a great place for a labyrinth. What a great place for a people from different faiths and cultures to come together to share thoughts and ideas about life, compassion, connectedness and hope.

My Unitarian faith journey has taken me from contemplating the murder of Michael Servetus for questioning Christian writings about the Trinity to thinking about present day religious murders based on anger about religious differences. I've been drawn to learn more about the International Association for Religious Freedom (IARF) and our Unitarian role in this group.

On several occasions **native spirituality** has entered my world – long ago at a Native Spring Spiritual event in Scarborough that included stories and strawberries, and at the TAIC, Toronto Area Interfaith Council breakfast and at the CUC ACM in Victoria where native spiritual leaders shared their traditions. Leslie Jermyn, a U of T anthropology professor, spoke at Don Heights on March 28, 2010. Her topic was "Why Religion is a Human Universal". I still occasionally listen to the tape of her service.

While watching the Joseph Campbell Myth series I've thought about what stories we are now creating to **explain our life meanings**. After visiting the Multi-Faith Centre at the University of Toronto and hearing about the Presidio Multi-Faith Centre in San Fransisco and participating in our own Multi-Faith Spiritual Dialogue group I have wondered how we can learn to respect different "meaning stories". How do we live an authentic life respecting individual differences in belief while speaking out when groups declare that their story is the only right story?

The Milne House in Milne Hollow in the Charles Sauriol Conservation Area, could grow into a peaceful intergenerational place to connect with the interdependent web of life and a welcoming multi-faith place to share a cup of coffee while promoting caring conversations about religion and the human condition. Don Heights could help to create, care for and polish this gem.

Sharing out Faith

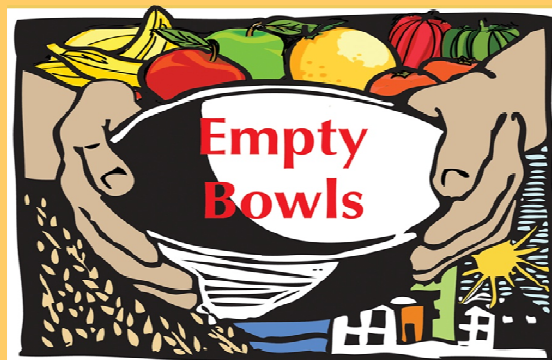

Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?

Our production of An Evening With Noel Coward on March 12th commanded our best attendance ever, with 17 avid theatre-goers enjoying two of Coward's finest, *Bon Voyage* and *Mr. and Mrs. Edgehill*. After the latter, there wasn't a dry eye in the house!

The 1966 film version of *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf* stars Elizabeth Taylor, Richard Burton, George Segal, and Sandy Dennis.

George and Martha, played by Burton and Taylor, are an unforgettable couple, and provide an exploration of the marriage relationship, and the bonds that tie, that may cause you to re-examine some of your long-held assumptions. There are comic moments, but this is not a comedy. All four stars give superb performances. WAOVW won five Academy Awards, including best actress (Taylor) and best supporting actress (Dennis). WAOVW is drama of the first order.

*** New Book Club Selection for April ***

April 10, 2011—The book *Small Wonders [Essays]* by Barbara Kingsolver was originally suggested as the selection for the April Book Club. However, I would like to use this book in the fall to facilitate a four-week book study as I think it deserves more in-depth study and hope you will participate in those discussions.

As an alternative, I am suggesting a book by Swedish author Ninni Holmqvist. The book is entitled *The Unit* and there are sufficient copies available at the library for our needs. The story is a gripping exploration of a society in the throes of an experiment in which the “dispensable” ones [those who do not have children or anyone else to love them] are convinced, under gentle coercion, of the importance of sacrificing for the “necessary” ones. They are picked up at their homes at the age of 50 and taken to special units. The author has created a debut novel of humour, sorrow, and rage about love, the close bonds of friendship and about a cynical, utilitarian way of thinking disguised as care. It should make for a great discussion.

May 29, 2011 – *Nikolski* by Nicolas Dickner – This is the Canada Reads Book for this year and it was written originally in French. In the spring of 1989, three young people, born thousands of miles apart, cut themselves adrift from their birthplaces and set out to discover what - or who - might anchor them in their lives. They each leave almost everything behind, carrying with them only a few artifacts of their lives (possessions that have proven so formative that they can't imagine surviving without them), but also the accumulated memories of their lives and family histories.

Getting to Know Don Heighters: Jim Mitchell

Many of us know Jim Mitchell as that tall bearded gentleman who always smiles, looks after the sound system, brings in brownies and chickpea casserole for our potlucks, folds the Bulletin, and does the vacuuming at Don Heights. There is a great deal more to know, however.

Jim discovered Unitarianism in the late 1990's, when his marriage ended. Realizing that he would need social support, he researched Unitarianism and was struck by the idea of "a church where you don't have to believe all that religious stuff." Accordingly, he joined the Willowdale Congregation. When Willowdale folded in 2001, he tried out Toronto First and Don Heights for comparison, and found Don Heights to be more friendly, less formal, less "churchy," and also strongly humanist, which really appealed to Jim.

A retired medical doctor, Jim served three years as a Battalion Surgeon in the US Army and then moved to Toronto, where he served the city government in Public Health, eventually becoming Medical Officer of Health for the City of York. He took early retirement in 1996 and now keeps busy at Don Heights, reads, tinkers about his house, and listens to CBC Radio.

One of the questions asked for these profiles is "If you could become a superhero, what would you want your powers to be and why?" Jim's answer (in part) was that being a superhero is far more responsibility than he would want, especially since he has learned that problems are far more complex than they appear at first glance, and lasting solutions include changing how the participants think and feel about the situation. This of course can be very difficult. He says that he spent a lot of his life being a Chief, and now he "just wants to be an Indian".

When he returned the questionnaire to the office, Jim also included a credo statement from "Building Your Own Theology" which proved to be very interesting. In it he said: "It appears that homo sapiens evolved as an intensely social animal which values group cohesion and is programmed toward conquest of non-group members, other animals and the environment. . . Our challenge is to evolve into a species that has non-destructive relations with other humans, animals, and the environment before we destroy ourselves."

In a post script on God he wrote: "I do not believe in any of the gods of the religions which I know about because I believe the religions and their gods are completely man made. But just because God has not been discovered by man does not mean God does not exist any more than the failure of man up until recently to discover and recognize dinosaur remains caused dinosaurs to not exist."

As for God, Jim favours the Buddhist response, which is that when one Buddhist was asked whether there is a God, he replied, "There are more important questions." Jim understands that to mean that what we do each day is far more important than whether we believe in a particular creed, a particular god, or any god at all.

A quiet and modest man, Jim none-the-less is a fascinating conversationalist and is interested in many different topics and disciplines. Like all Unitarians, there is much more to Jim than meets the eye, and he is worth getting to know better.

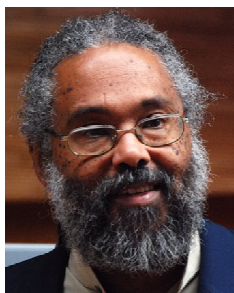
