## President's Thoughts



### Middle Childhood Matters to All of Us

Lately, I've been thinking about how busy I seem to be since retirement. I'm sure many of you can relate to the dilemma of juggling priorities. Throughout January I've been unsuccessful trying to drop one of the following six balls:

- As co-chair of the Middle Childhood Matters Coalition Toronto (MCMC), we try to influence policy decisions that will result in affordable (tax funded), skill-building, out of school programs for all Toronto children ages 6 to 12.
- As Don Heights' President, I have a vision of an exciting new multi-faith space for Don Heights maybe in partnership with the City of Toronto at the Charles Sauriol Conservation Area.
- As Don Heights President, I would like us to find a way for Don Heights to contribute to the lives of children and young families in our part of Toronto
- As a member of the TDSB Community Use of Schools Advisory Committee, I hope to help recruit more CUSAC members from across the city to ensure that our public schools are used and appreciated by neighbourhood residents.
- Then above all of these, I try to be a good mother and grandmother supporting my kids as needed.
- There's also the need to buy and cook healthy food, build a better relationship with the planet and improve my fitness level.

This month I want to share a little about a priority that I can't ever drop. In 2003 some colleagues and I formed a coalition called Middle Childhood Matters - Toronto: [www.middlechildhoodmatterstoronto.on.ca](http://www.middlechildhoodmatterstoronto.on.ca). We agreed on the need for a greater public focus on the health and wellbeing of children in the age group 6 to 12. There has been a great deal of attention placed on the early years – pre-natal to six and on the struggles of adolescence but the

importance of the ages between the beginning and end of childhood seemed to be lost. We explored the work of a small group of researchers across the country who were studying the foundations of resiliency and the benefits of age appropriate, high quality, skill building programs run by caring adults with high expectations.

Sadly, we also found that the media and the average person were more concerned about garbage pick-up, off-leash dog parks, potholes and timely bus service (all important issues), than about the availability of suitable neighbourhood programs for school-aged children. We wanted children to be higher on public and political agendas. Like most social issues, this is an equity issue. Great academic, arts, sports and social programs are available in a patchwork across the city. There are programs available if parents can afford the fees just like there were schools available for the wealthy before our public school system was developed. Research conducted by Social Planning Toronto in 2008 - 2009 for Middle Childhood Matters identified 534 Monday to Friday programs providing services to just under 10% (18,205) of Toronto's 192,525 children ages 6 to 12. These figures provided a strong impetus for our coalition to carry on with our work to create greater awareness of the benefits of quality programs both for individual children and for society in general. I look forward to a day when taxpayers are demanding quality out-of-school programs for children in every neighbourhood.

I'm informally recruiting supporters for Middle Childhood Matters. How about checking out your own local school? Most people only enter a school on election days after their own children have graduated. Middle Childhood Matters would like to make children everybody's business. Find out if your school or a partner organization offers quality, affordable programs for kids after school, on weekends and during holidays. Your curiosity will likely surprise the school staff and let them know that middle childhood matters to you. We can provide you with a questionnaire to help with this grassroots research.

Lorna and Jeanne have had one meeting with City Staff and other interested individuals. The Board suggested further questions to be asked at the next meeting.

## Chaplaincy Fees

Don Heights will pay the officiating chaplain \$200 for memorial services conducted for members.

The revised lay chaplain price list was approved. This new list is posted on the hall bulletin boards.

## Future of R.E.

A teacher will be hired, as soon as possible, for 2.5 hours on Sundays, plus 1.5 hours preparation time.

There will be a review of this initiative in June 2011.

## Playlab – Family Friendly Program

The Board approved that Playlab will use our facility to provide a free workshop on Saturday, February 26, 2011 from 2-4 pm for children in grades one to six.

## Celtic Folk Music

The Board approved for Christine Cover and Heather Dale to plan this event March 5. Proceeds will be shared between Don Heights and the artist.

- Model multi-generational community
- Decision made regarding accommodation/location

- Collaborative partnerships
- Involvement in community processes (beyond DH)
- A leadership role in inter-faith affairs

## The Goals of our Strategic Plan for the years 2010 to 2013 are:

1. To develop a plan regarding leadership, professional or otherwise.
2. To increase the size and diversity of our congregation.
3. To operate within a balanced budget as soon as possible or by 2013
4. To work toward moving into space more appropriate for our mission.
5. To remain committed to having a friendly, inclusive atmosphere marked by meaningful connections in a multigenerational community.
6. To enhance our social action programs.
7. To remain engaged in interfaith affairs
8. To enrich our life-span learning program to meet the needs of both our present members and the multi-generational (diverse) members we hope to serve.

## Don Heights Book Group

February 20, 2011 – *The Other Wes Moore* by Wes Moore – Two strangely similar boys take starkly different paths in this searing tale of the ghetto. Moore, an investment banker, Rhodes scholar, and former aide to Condoleezza Rice, was intrigued when he learned that another Wes Moore, his age and from the same area of Greater Baltimore, was wanted for killing a cop. Meeting his double and delving into his life makes for a moving exploration of roads not taken.



March 20, 2011 – *Dahanu Road* by Anosh Irani – Zairos is a dissolute young landowner's son living in the town of Dahanu, just outside Bombay, when his life of careless luxury is brought up short by a mysterious death: the sudden suicide of Ganpat, a tribal worker on his family's estate. Soon Zairos has fallen in love with Ganpat's daughter Kusum, and finds himself defying taboos with their relationship. At the same time his grandfather, Shapur, reveals to him the story of their family and of the land that Zairos stands to inherit. Violence and hatred echo through history, and Zairos learns the terrible truth his grandfather has spent a lifetime hiding.

*A book is the only place in which you can examine a fragile thought without breaking it, or explore an explosive idea without fear it will go off in your face. It is one of the few havens remaining where a man's mind can get both provocation and privacy.*

## Don Heights Workshop

### A Fair Country by John Ralston Saul A four-week series which began January 20th

You might want to consider joining us on these four Thursday evenings from 7:00-8:30 p.m. The ideas presented in this book have been well debated across the country and have elicited much controversy. If you haven't been able to get the book you can check for information on the internet and participate in the discussion.

According to Saul, Canada is not primarily a "European" nation created in the image and values inherited from France and Great Britain. Instead, he asserts that we are a Metis nation, that our ideas, values and institutions are influenced by the original and on-going encounter between French and English speaking immigrants and the First Nations people.

Indeed, more than that, Saul claims we are more aboriginal than we are European and that our failure to come to terms with this foundational experience and reality prevents Canada from being the self-confident and progressive nation that it should and could be.

As a result, we misrepresent ourselves to ourselves; we don't know who we really are. This fact about us has dire consequences; a dysfunctional elite, an uncertain, frustrated citizenry seriously adrift and a nation plagued by an endemic problem; poisonous relations between European and recent immigrations and for First Nations people.

## DH Festival Theatre Cyrano de Bergerac Saturday February 12, 2011



Mark your calendar now for a special treat on Saturday, February 12!

Edmond Rostand's *Cyrano de Bergerac*, produced in 1990, stars the incomparable Gerard Depardieu in the title role. This production is the first theatrical film version of Rostand's original play in color. The poetic dialogue (audio in French) is extraordinary; the English subtitles use the Anthony Burgess translation of the text, which preserves the rhyming alexandrines of the original.

Written in 1897 by Rostand, this play amazed contemporary audiences with its lines of rhyming (French) verse. In addition all the significant characters mentioned are people actually living at the time of the events portrayed. This very popular play has been translated into many languages, performed and adapted thousands of times, and is responsible for introducing the word "panache" into the English language.

*Cyrano de Bergerac* was nominated for several Academy awards including best actor, best foreign film and best art direction, and won for costume design. It won many European awards from Cannes, Cesar, European Film, Golden Globe and BAFTA (British Academy of Film and Television Arts). This film has everything - excitement, swordfighting, adventure, romance, pathos! Did I mention the delightful dialogue?

A multi-instrumentalist and possessed of a beautiful soprano voice, Heather has been compared to both Loreena McKennitt and Sarah McLaughlin, but she has a sound all her own. She fuses Celtic folk with jazz, blues, rock, and world music influences, and much of her music has a whimsical quality to it which is very difficult to describe in words. ## CUC 2011 Annual Conference

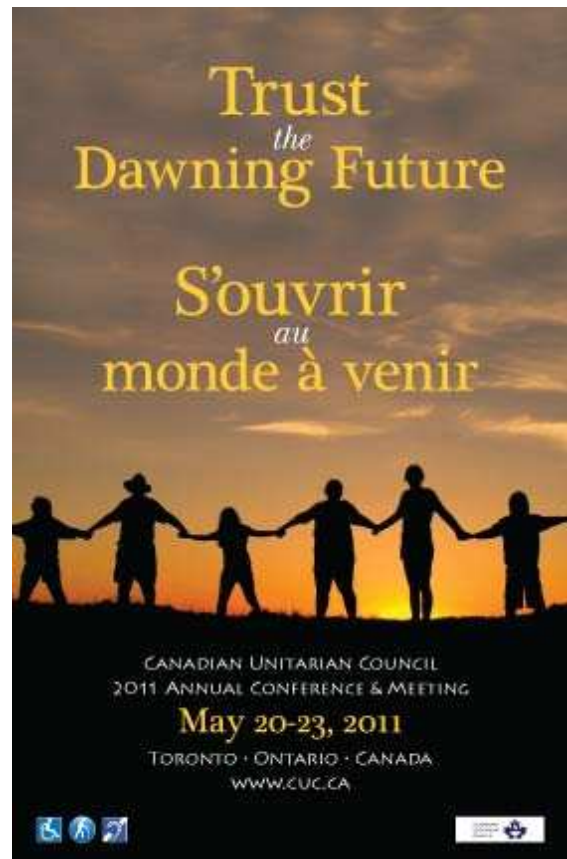
From May 20 to 23, 2011, First Unitarian Congregation of Toronto will be hosting the 50th Annual Conference: ***Trust the Dawning Future.***
