# President's Thoughts



## Is Reason Enough?

I've been thinking a lot lately about how we speak about our Unitarian religion being based on "reason". I think I've said this with pride, as if "reason or logic" were elevated beyond other stimuli, incentives, motivations or spurs to action – as if reason is maybe 'sacred' in some way.

Just before Christmas a few of us from Don Heights attended the Interfaith Festival of Lights. We enjoyed the Universal Worship Service with music and readings from the Divine Feminine, Hinduism, Buddhism, Zoroastrian, Jain, Baha'i, Judaism, Christianity and Islam. I let reason, discussion and dialogue wait for me on the street and enjoyed the music, the songs, the words and the dance. I felt connected. I felt mystery.

I felt peaceful.

We sometimes ask "What is the rhyme or reason of this or that?" These words rhyme and reason were used by Shakespeare to indicate that an idea, action or explanation without either a poetic/aesthetic/ordered or logical basis is senseless. Shakespeare, Erasmus and John Skelton gave rhyme and reason equal status as motivators. When you think about it, we are told it is good to balance our lives with rhyme and reason - heart and head.

We know from many political examples that logic or reason is not a strong motivator. People choose partners and politicians and support action driven by emotion, not by logical arguments.

We act because of love or hate or sometimes various derivations like empathy or jealousy. Then later, we work on figuring out the reason, the rationale behind our actions.

I chose to be a Unitarian because I love freedom and justice as opposed to oppression and injustice. I'm not a Unitarian to negate the religious beliefs of others nor the creeds of my own past faith group. Rather I am happy that I have found a religion whose theology encourages me to participate in a never-ending search for truth and meaning and to find and live my best self. I rejoice that I have found an intentional religious community committed to providing opportunities for companionship on this journey toward freedom and justice.

I think and hope ours is an unreasonable religion as opposed to a religion which is trying to use reason to help us adapt to the world. George Bernard Shaw in Maxims for Revolutionaries makes the statement that "The reasonable man adapts himself to the world: the unreasonable one persists in trying to adapt the world to himself. Therefore all progress depends on the unreasonable man." If we, Unitarians, are lovers of freedom and justice does it not follow that we want the whole world to join us in our love for freedom and justice. We want the world to adapt.

Isn't Unitarian Universalism a religion of revolutionary passion with a touch of reason?

Other possible workshops could include: finance and canvas, policies and procedures, safe congregations, attracting and motivating volunteers, visioning and mission, growth transitions, welcoming diversity and visitors, lifespan learning and youth ministry.

## Don Heights Book Group

January 16, 2011 – *Too Much Happiness* by Alice Munro – The signature locations – the towns and cities of southwestern Ontario and coastal B.C. – and the minutely etched Munro characters - the striving young women boxed in by convention, family ties, and self-sabotage, and the careless and calculating men who promise them a richer life, then deliver too much or too little on that promise.



Friends, lovers, cousins, maiden aunts, stricken mothers, distant fathers, and suddenly intimate strangers all act in ways that are both duplicitous and guileless, frank and secretive, stubborn and yielding. Many consider Alice Munro to be the best English-language author writing today.

February 20, 2011 – *The Other Wes Moore* by Wes Moore – Two strangely similar boys take starkly different paths in this searing tale of the ghetto. Moore, an investment banker, Rhodes scholar, and former aide to Condoleezza Rice, was intrigued when he learned that another Wes Moore, his age and from the same area of Greater Baltimore, was wanted for killing a cop. Meeting his double and delving into his life makes for a moving exploration of roads not taken.

It was also Shaw's first venture into melodrama, which he successfully combined with his tongue in cheek humour. Although the first production of the play was in Albany, New York, it was instrumental in his rise to the first ranks of English theatre.
